Strategic Report

For the year ended 31 March 2022

The Directors present their Strategic Report for Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited ("the company") for the year ended 31 March 2022.

Review of business

The principle activity of the company is to hold investments in other Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited (the ultimate parent company – see note 18) subsidiary companies; the only direct investment currently held is in Quadgas HoldCo Limited. The Directors are not aware at the date of this report, of any likely major changes in the company's activities or prospects in the next year.

Results

The company's profit for the year was £924,000,000 (2021: £224,000,000) as disclosed on page 15.

The movement is largely due to the reversal of a previous impairment of investments of £794,000,000 (2021: £101,000,000), coupled with higher dividend income of £135,000,000 in 2022 (2021: £127,400,000). The impairment reversal was recognised following an impairment review completed by management which indicated that the impairment loss recognised in prior years had decreased due to the receipt of the CMA Final Determination in year and significant changes to inflation (see note 8). During the year the company incurred asset management fees of £6,070,000 (2021: £5,718,000) in accordance with the Asset Management and Advisory Services Agreement with Macquarie Infrastructure and Real Assets (Europe) Limited.

Financial position

The financial position of the company is presented in the statement of financial position. Total shareholders' funds at 31 March 2022 were £4,158,000,000 (2021: £3,369,000,000) comprising primarily of investments in Group undertakings of £4,148,000,000 (2021: £3,354,000,000). The company has external borrowings of £902,000,000 (2021: £902,000,000) which it passes on to Quadgas HoldCo Limited on identical terms.

Key performance indicators and principal risks and uncertainties

As the company is part of a larger group comprising of its direct holding in Quadgas HoldCo Limited and its indirect subsidiary holdings as set out in note 8 ("the Group"), the management of the company does not involve the use of key performance indicators, other than the profit or loss for the year, in measuring the development, performance or the position of the company and the principal risks and uncertainties are integrated with the principal risks of Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited.

Future developments

By nature of its operating business, Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited has not been significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic or the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, and the Directors believe the company will continue to act as a holding company for the foreseeable future.

As a holding company, Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited is not currently significantly impacted by climate change. However, Climate change is a global challenge and an emerging risk to business, people and the environment across the world. The Group has a role to play in limiting warming by improving our energy management, reducing our carbon emissions and by helping our customers do the same. Certain elements of the financial statements are dependent on the future use of the network (see note 8). For information on how climate change will impact the Group's operating company, Cadent Gas Limited, refer to the Strategic Report included in Cadent Gas Limited's Annual Report and Accounts 2021/2022.

S172 Statement

The following statement describes how the Directors have had regard to the matters set out in section 172(1) (a) to (f) when performing their duty under section 172 of the Companies Act 2006.

The company has no employees and no operational activities; it is a financing company for shareholder debt. The company's principle activity is to hold investments in the parent company's (Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited) other subsidiary companies.

As a wholly owned subsidiary holding company, the Directors consider the impact of the company's activities on its stakeholders, consisting of its shareholder, its subsidiaries and other stakeholders including (but not limited to) Ofgem (The Office of Gas and Electricity Markets), the UK Government, banks and other financial institutions, and members of the consortium who together own the parent company. Whilst not directly regulated itself, the company maintains a close relationship with Ofgem, via the indirect subsidiary company Cadent Gas Limited.

The company's stakeholders are consulted routinely on a wide range of matters including funding decisions, investment strategy, delivery of the Group's strategy, governance and compliance with Group policies with the aim of maximising investment returns for the benefit of its shareholder and ensuring that its subsidiaries maintain high standards of business conduct and governance. The Board considers the consequences of its decisions through these consultations to ensure that the long-term interests of the company are protected.

As an investment vehicle for the Group, the company obtains and provides finance to fellow subsidiary companies via intercompany balances. The Board considers the company's investments in light of the Group's environmental, corporate and social responsibility strategies, as such the Board receives information on these topics from management to make better informed Board decisions.

The Directors delegate authority for day-to-day management of the company and other subsidiaries in the Group to the Executive Committee and then engage management in setting, approving and overseeing execution of the business strategy, to ensure that company policies and practices support effective decision making to deliver long-term value.

The Directors continue to provide oversight governance of the company and its subsidiaries to ensure that they comply with the Group's policies and maintain high standards of business conduct which are a key priority for the Group. The company provides regular updates on its activities to the Directors.

Dividends

On the 20 January 2022, an interim dividend of 0.032p per ordinary share amounting to £100,000,000 was declared and paid on 21 January 2022.

On the 23 March 2022, an interim dividend of 0.011p per ordinary share amounting to £35,000,000 was declared and paid on 28 March 2022.

The Directors do not propose a final dividend for the current year.

Political donations and political expenditure

The company did not make any donations during the year (2021: £Nil).

Research and development

The company spent £Nil (2021: £Nil) on research and development during the year.

Financial risk management

The management of the company and the execution of the company's strategy are subject to a number of financial risks. The Directors have identified the need to manage the company's material financial risks, including liquidity, credit, exchange rate risk, interest rate risks, inflation rate risks, and the use of derivative and non-derivative financial instruments.

The company acts as a conduit for finance raised and any related derivative transactions between the market and its immediate subsidiary company, and amounts raised or entered into are usually passed on to its immediate subsidiary on identical terms. The company's exposures are limited to the credit risk on the intercompany loans (as disclosed below and in note 9).

The company has limited direct exposure to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic or the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, however we recognise the potential macroeconomic impacts on interest rates and foreign exchange rates on our underlying debt portfolio. These impacts are addressed through our financial risk management.

Liquidity risk

Ultimate responsibility for liquidity risk management rests with the Board of Directors, which has established an appropriate liquidity risk management framework for the management of the Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited's (the immediate parent company) short, medium and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The company manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and reserve borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows, and by matching the maturity profiles of external borrowings and intercompany receivables.

Credit risk

The company raises debt finance for other Group subsidiaries. Amounts raised are usually passed on to subsidiaries on identical terms. The principal risk of these arrangements is that the subsidiary is unable to meet its obligations to the company. The company is exposed to the expected credit losses on its intercompany loan with its subsidiary. The expected credit loss has been calculated by considering the probability of default and the loss given default on the balance outstanding on the intercompany loan.

Interest rate risk

The company has interest bearing intercompany assets. To the extent that the company enters into intercompany loan agreements, the company's exposure to interest rate cash flow risk arises on such loans on which interest is charged based upon a floating index. There were no such loans at 31 March 2022.

Engagement with employees

The company itself has no employees and therefore does not meet the thresholds requiring it to prepare a statement setting out engagement with employees and therefore has nothing to report in respect of employee engagement activity during the year.

However, within the Group there is a subsidiary that exceeds the requirements for reporting on employee engagement (Cadent Gas Limited), with an average number of employees of 5,945 (2021: 5,258). Cadent Gas Limited has provided extensive disclosure in relation to employee engagement. Going concern

The statement of financial position shows net assets of £4,158,000,000 at 31 March 2022 (2021: £3,369,000,000). The income statement shows a profit for the year ended 31 March 2022 of £924,000,000 (2021: £224,000,000). The movement is largely due to the reversal of a previous impairment of investments of £794,000,000 (2021: £101,000,000), coupled with higher dividend income of £135,000,000 in 2022 (2021: £127,400,000). The loan liabilities are not repayable until 2043, and the interest payable on the liability is matched to the interest receivable from Quadgas HoldCo Limited on the same terms. The company continues to receive dividend income from Quadgas HoldCo Limited which continues to operate as a going concern as at 31 March 2022. See the Directors report within the Quadgas HoldCo Limited Annual Report and Accounts for further details.

Having considered the above, the Directors have concluded that the company has the ability to repay liabilities as they fall due for at least 12 months, and therefore consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis. Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited has not been significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic or the ongoing conflict in Ukraine. The Directors are satisfied that the company has adequate resources to remain in operation, and that the Directors intend it to do so, for at least one year from the date the financial statements are signed. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Post balance sheet events

There were no post balance sheet events.

Disclosure of information to auditors

Having made the requisite enquiries, so far as the Directors in office at the date of the approval of this report are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware and each Director has taken all reasonable steps to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information. This confirmation is given and should be interpreted in accordance with the provisions of section 418 of the Companies Act 2006.

The auditors have indicated their willingness to continue in office, and a resolution that they be re-appointed will be proposed at the annual general meeting.

The company has established internal control and risk management systems in relation to the process for preparing its financial statements. The key features of these internal control and risk management systems are:

- Management regularly monitors and considers developments in accounting regulations and best practice in financial reporting, and where appropriate, reflects developments in the financial statements. Appropriate briefings and/or training are provided to key finance personnel on relevant developments in accounting and financial reporting.
- The financial statements are subject to review by the Financial Reporting function for unusual items, unexplained trends and completeness. Any unexplained items are investigated.
- The Board review the draft financial statements. The Board receive reports from management on significant judgements, changes in accounting policies, changes in accounting estimates and other pertinent matters relating to the consolidated financial statements.

Capital structure

The share capital of the company consists of 311,653,789,270 ordinary shares of £0.001 each.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

1. Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements of Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited (the 'company'):

- give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs as at 31 March 2022 and of its profit for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom adopted international accounting standards and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB); and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

We have audited the financial statements which comprise:

- the statement of comprehensive income;
- the statement of financial position;
- the statement of changes in equity;
- the statement of cash flows; and
- the related notes 1 to 18.

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law, United Kingdom adopted international accounting standards and IFRSs as issued by the IASB.

2. Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report.

We are independent of the company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the Financial Reporting Council's (the 'FRC's') Ethical Standard as applied to listed entities, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

4. Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Our evaluation of the directors' assessment of the company's ability to continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting included:

- assessment of the company's role within the wider Quadgas group as an intermediate holding and financing company, including the company's funding sources, the nature of its loan liabilities and repayment terms;
- assessment of the appropriateness of management's forecasted cash flows for the group and covenants under the base case and the reasonable worst case scenario;
- analysis of management's mitigating factors, such as reduced working capital, reduced dividend distributions and re-profiling of their capital spend; and
- assessment of the disclosures in the financial statements relating to going concern.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the company's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the directors with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

5. Key audit matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period and include the most significant assessed risks of material misstatement (whether or not due to fraud) that we identified. These matters included those which had the greatest effect on: the overall audit strategy, the allocation of resources in the audit; and directing the efforts of the engagement team.

These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

5.1. Valuation of unlisted investments



Key audit matter description

The company has unlisted investments of £4,148m as at 31 March 2022 (2021: £3,354m), valued at cost less impairment. These investments comprise an investment in Quadgas HoldCo Limited and its subsidiaries and are highly material to the company as they account for 82% of total assets (2021: 78%). The valuation of these investments is largely underpinned by the valuation of the gas assets held by Cadent Gas Limited. An impairment reversal of £794m has been recognised during the year.

Judgement is required by the directors as to whether the investments should be impaired or whether there are identifiable favourable indicators that a reversal of an impairment loss can be recognised based on the financial position and future prospects of the investments.

The recoverable amount is estimated from value in use calculations whereby the key assumptions underpinning the cash flows are:

- discount rate;
- inflation rate (CPIH);
- future regulatory cost of equity; and
- regulatory asset value ('RAV') exit multiple.

The regulatory cost of equity represents the expected rate of return on investment that is required by a company's shareholders. The regulatory cost of equity is calculated by Ofgem and is set for five-year periods known as price control periods. The inflation indexation applied is the Consumer Price Index including owner occupiers' housing costs (CPIH).

These assumptions are sensitive to publications by Ofgem regarding future price control periods from FY27 ('RIIO-GD3' and beyond). There have been no publications regarding future price control periods following the conclusion of the Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) appeal by Cadent Gas Limited over the Ofgem RIIO-GD2 Final Determination in the current year, that will apply for FY23 through to FY26.

Furthermore, the UK Government has enacted legislation and established targets in respect of net zero carbon emissions by 2050 and, accordingly, climate related risks represent a strategic challenge to the group.

As described in Note 8 the to the financial statements management considered the potential uses for the group's gas assets as part of their consideration around whether developments in the UK towards binding carbon reduction targets should trigger any changes to the group's estimates, judgements or disclosures. Management's assessment included an overview of the risks and opportunities arising as a result of the UK Government's legislative changes in this regard. Having analysed the potential decarbonisation pathways, management has identified potential uses for the group's gas pipeline assets in a net zero energy system, including the opportunity to drive forward the UK's hydrogen economy. Management concluded that the group's gas network UK will continue to have an economic use beyond 2045.

Further details are included within significant accounting policies in note 1(f) and note 8 (investments in group undertakings) to the financial statements.

How the scope of our audit responded to the key audit matter

We, together with our internal valuations, regulatory and climate change specialists, have utilised the group assessment for the value in use of Quadgas MidCo Limited impairment assessment which included:

- obtained an understanding of relevant controls around the value in use calculations, the discount rate and inflation forecasts, amongst other key assumptions;
- understood and challenged management's method, data and key assumptions of the estimate for the RIIO-GD3 control period and beyond together with management's prepared sensitivity analysis. This included assessing the outcome of management's appeal to the CMA on Ofgem's RIIO-GD2 Final Determination and the associated estimates of forecast cash flows:
- performed an independent sensitivity analysis;
- assessed the appropriateness of the regulatory cost of equity, discount rate, forecast inflation (CPIH), and RAV exit multiple;
- assessed the impact of climate change and sustainability risks on the cash flow forecasts, including reviewing comparable transactions to challenge the appropriateness of a terminal value;
- evaluated the consistency of management's assumptions within the impairment model with those applied in the group's other valuation and

forecast models (e.g. those used for operating the business and for going concern):

- assessed the implied multiple of Enterprise Value to RAV against other comparable regulated businesses; and
- tested the arithmetical accuracy of management's model for inconsistencies and errors.

Furthermore, we also performed the following procedures specific to the company:

- assessed the recoverable amount against the net carrying value of the investment held in Quadgas HoldCo Limited and its subsidiaries;
- evaluated the reasons for the changes in the estimate and whether these
 were identifiable impairment reversal indicators with particular focus on
 the changes in regulatory cost of equity and inflation; and
- assessed the disclosures included in the financial statements.

Based on the work performed, we concluded that the carrying value of unlisted investments is appropriate.


6. Our application of materiality

6.1. Materiality

We define materiality as the magnitude of misstatement in the financial statements that makes it probable that the economic decisions of a reasonably knowledgeable person would be changed or influenced. We use materiality both in planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work.

Based on our professional judgement, we determined materiality for the financial statements as a whole as follows:

Materiality	£35.6m (2021: £41.6m)
Basis for determining materiality	We determined materiality with reference to net assets. Additionally, we capped materiality at 95% of the materiality used for the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the group's intermediate parent company Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited. Our determined materiality equates to 0.86% (2021: 1.20%) of net assets.
Rationale for the benchmark applied	We determined materiality based on net assets as this is the key metric used by management, investors, analysts and lenders to assess the value of this company.



6.2. Performance materiality

We set performance materiality at a level lower than materiality to reduce the probability that, in aggregate, uncorrected and undetected misstatements exceed the materiality for the financial statements as a whole. Performance materiality was set at 70% of materiality for the 2022 audit (2021: 70%). In determining performance materiality, we considered the following factors:

- a. the quality of the control environment;
- b. the low number of corrected and uncorrected misstatements in previous audits;
- c. the consistency of the business year on year.

6.3. Error reporting threshold

We agreed with the directors that we would report to the directors all audit differences in excess of £1.7m (2021: £2.0m), as well as differences below that threshold that, in our view, warranted reporting on qualitative grounds. We also report to the Audit Committee on disclosure matters that we identified when assessing the overall presentation of the financial statements.

7. An overview of the scope of our audit

7.1. Scoping

Our audit was scoped by obtaining an understanding of the entity and its environment, including internal control, and assessing the risks of material misstatement. Audit work to respond to the risks of material misstatement was performed directly by the audit engagement team.

7.2. Our consideration of the control environment

The company's accounting records are held within the group's financial accounting and reporting software platform, SAP. We have worked with our IT specialists to test key General Information Technology Controls (GITC) within the platform, including testing over controls for access, change management and segregation of duties.

We also gained an understanding over the control environment over the treasury business cycle and the related account balances.

8. Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

9. Responsibilities of directors

As explained more fully in the directors' responsibilities statement, the directors are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

10. Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

11.Extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below.

11.1. Identifying and assessing potential risks related to irregularities

In identifying and assessing risks of material misstatement in respect of irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations, we considered the following:

- the nature of the industry and sector, control environment and business performance including the design of the company's remuneration policies, key drivers for directors' remuneration, bonus levels and performance targets;
- results of our enquiries of management and in-house legal counsel and the audit committee about their own identification and assessment of the risks of irregularities;
- any matters we identified having obtained and reviewed the company's documentation of their policies and procedures relating to:
 - o identifying, evaluating and complying with laws and regulations and whether they were aware of any instances of non-compliance;
 - o detecting and responding to the risks of fraud and whether they have knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;
 - o the internal controls established to mitigate risks of fraud or non-compliance with laws and regulations;
- The matters discussed among the audit engagement team and relevant internal specialists, including tax, valuations, climate change, pensions and IT specialists regarding how and where fraud might occur in the financial statements and any potential indicators of fraud.

- In addressing the risk of fraud through management override of controls, testing the appropriateness of journal entries and other adjustments; assessing whether the judgements made in making accounting estimates are indicative of a potential bias; and evaluating the business rationale of any significant transactions that are unusual or outside the normal course of business.

We also communicated relevant identified laws and regulations and potential fraud risks to all engagement team members including internal specialists and remained alert to any indications of fraud or non-compliance with laws and regulations throughout the audit.

Report on other legal and regulatory requirements

12. Opinions on other matters prescribed by the Companies Act 2006

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of the audit:

- the information given in the strategic report and the directors' report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements; and
- the strategic report and the directors' report have been prepared in accordance with applicable legal requirements.

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified any material misstatements in the strategic report or the directors' report.

13. Matters on which we are required to report by exception

13.1. Adequacy of explanations received and accounting records

Under the Companies Act 2006 we are required to report to you if, in our opinion:

- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- adequate accounting records have not been kept, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns.

We have nothing to report in respect of these matters.

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2022

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements of Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited have been prepared in accordance with international accounting standards in conformity with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited is exempt from the requirement to prepare consolidated accounts under the Companies Act 2006 section 400 given it is a wholly owned subsidiary of Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited. Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited is a company incorporated in Jersey, Channel Islands. Copies of Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited's consolidated financial statements can be obtained from the Registered office, Quadgas Holdings TopCo Limited, 3rd Floor 37 Esplanade, St. Helier, Jersey, JE1 1AD.

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out as below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the periods presented, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited have been prepared in accordance with United Kingdom adopted international accounting standards and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB), and in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis. The financial statements have been prepared on an historical cost basis and modified to include certain items at fair value where applicable. Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the company operates (the 'functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in pounds sterling which is also the company's functional currency.

The preparation of financial statements may require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities and the reported amounts of turnover and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Climate change is a global challenge and an emerging risk to business, people and the environment across the world. As a holding company, Quadgas Investments BidCo Limited's operations are not significantly impacted however those of Cadent Gas Limited, an indirect subsidiary and the Group's operating company, is. It has a role to play in limiting warming by improving energy management, reducing carbon emissions and by helping its customers do the same. For further information on how climate change will impact the Group's operating company, refer to the Cadent Gas Annual Report and Accounts 2021/22.

(b) New IFRS accounting standards and interpretations

There are no new or amended standards or interpretations during the year that have a significant impact on the financial statements

(c) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

(d) Net interest costs

Interest income and interest costs are accrued on a timely basis by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable. Interest income is included in interest receivable and similar income and interest cost is included in the interest payable and similar charges.

(e) Tax

The tax charge for the period is recognised in the statement of total comprehensive income or directly in equity according to the accounting treatment of the related transaction.

(e) Tax (continued)

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amounts expected to be recovered from or paid to the tax authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amounts are those that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

The calculation of the total tax charge involves a degree of estimation and judgement, and management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulation is subject to interpretation and establishes positions where appropriate on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

(f) Investments in Group undertakings

Investments in Group undertakings are held at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

Impairment reviews are carried out if there is some indication that impairment may have occurred, or where otherwise required to ensure that investments are not carried above their estimated recoverable amounts. Impairments are recognised in the income statement, and, where material, are disclosed separately. Impairment reversals are recognised when there is an indication that an impairment loss for an investment either no longer exists or has decreased.

Impairments of investments are calculated as the difference between the carrying value of the investment and its recoverable amounts. Recoverable amount is defined as the higher of net realisable value or estimated value in use at the date the impairment review is undertaken.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet.

(h) Financial instruments

Initial recognition

Financial assets, liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Classification and measurement

Financial instruments are classified at inception into one of the following categories which then determines the subsequent measurement methodology:

Financial assets are classified into one of the following three categories:

- financial assets at amortised cost; or
- financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI); or
- financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL).

(h) Financial instruments (continued)

Financial liabilities are classified into one of the following two categories:

- financial liabilities at amortised cost; or
- financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL).

Loans receivable are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method less any allowance for estimated impairments. A provision is established for impairments when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due under the original terms of the loan. Interest income, together with losses when the loans are impaired, is recognised using the effective interest method in the income statement.

Borrowings, which include interest-bearing loans, are recorded at their initial fair value which normally reflects the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs less any repayments. Subsequently these are stated at amortised cost, using the effective interest method. Any difference between proceeds and the redemption value is recognised over the term of the borrowing in the income statement using the effective interest method.

Derivative financial instruments ('derivatives') are recorded at fair value. Where the fair value of a derivative is positive, it is carried as a derivative asset and where negative, as a liability.

Assets and liabilities on different transactions are only netted if the transactions are with the same counterparty, a legal right of set off exists and the cash flows are intended to be settled on a net basis. Gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are included in the income statement in the period they arise.

The fair value of financial derivatives is calculated by discounting all future cash flows by the market yield curve at the reporting date, and adjusting for own and counterparty credit. The market yield curve for each currency is obtained from external sources for interest and foreign exchange rates.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of the impairment is the differences between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition

The company derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the company recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the company retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the company continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The company recognises loss allowances for expected credit losses (ECL) on financial instruments that are not measured at FVTPL, namely:

- trade receivables: and
- loan receivables; and
- other receivables.

The company measures the loss allowances for amounts owed by immediate parent company at an amount equal to the 12 month expected credit loss. The way this is calculated is based on the applied impairment methodology, as described below:

Stage 1: For financial assets where there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, and were not credit impaired on recognition, the company recognises a loss allowance based on the 12 month expected credit loss.

Stage 2: For financial assets where there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, and were not credit impaired, the company recognises a loss allowance for lifetime expected credit loss.

Stage 3: For financial assets which are credit impaired, the company recognises the lifetime expected credit loss.

A significant increase in credit risk would by any change in circumstances specific to the counterparty or to the wider economic environment whereby the risk of default could be said to have been significantly increased within reasonable thresholds.

Evidence that the financial asset is credit impaired includes the following:

- significant financial difficulties of the counterparty; or
- · a breach of contract such as default or past due event; or
- the restructuring of the loan or advance by the company that the company would not consider otherwise; or
- it is probably that the counterparty will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- the disappearance of an active market for an associated security because of financial difficulties.

(i) Dividends distributions

Dividend distributions to the company's shareholders are recognised as a liability in the company's financial statements in the period in which the dividends are approved by the company's shareholders.

(i) Trade and other payables

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one period or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade payables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(k) Borrowings

Borrowings are recognised initially at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost; any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption value is recognised in the income statement over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method.

2 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, which are described in note 1, the Directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Critical accounting judgements

Areas of judgement that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements are as follows:

• For the purpose of valuing our investment in the Group, the judgement is that the Cadent Gas network can be used for alternative technologies beyond 2050. The UK's target to achieve net zero by 2050 will change how fossil fuels are used, which will also impact how the network is used. The UK Government's current plans include the production and use of Hydrogen, although there remains uncertainty about significant aspects of the UK energy sector plans under net-zero. Given the information currently available regarding these plans and the initial feasibility studies completed regarding the use of alternative gases through our network and the large scale production of these gases, we have judged that the network will continue to be used to transport gas (methane, hydrogen, other alternatives such as biomethane or a combination of these) beyond 2050, and that these gases will be available in sufficient quantities. See note 8.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

Key sources of estimation uncertainty that have significant risk of causing material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the next financial year are as follows:

- The recoverability of intercompany balances. The amounts recognised in the financial statements for the impairment of amounts owed by the immediate parent company. The expected loss is calculated by determining the probability of default of the counterparty and the amount of the loan deemed likely to be recoverable in the event of default. The expected loss calculation is discussed further in note 1(h), note 9 and note 16.
- Review of carrying values of investments and calculation of impairment. Investments are reviewed annually for impairment by comparison of the cost of the investment with equity value, where equity value is equal to the value in use of the company invested in less any external borrowings plus any cash and cash equivalents. The impairment review requires management to calculate the value in use for investments. The key assumptions for the value in use calculation are those regarding the underlying cash flows, discount rate, regulatory weighted average cost of capital, inflation and terminal value cashflow.

A reversal of a previous impairment on the investment in subsidiary of £794,000,000 (2021: reversal of impairment of £101,000,000) was credited to the Statement of comprehensive income during the year. More details can be found in notes 8 and 16.

Annual impairment review

The net carrying value of the investment held in Quadgas HoldCo Limited and its subsidiaries was compared to its recoverable amount as part of the annual impairment review carried out by management.

The impairment test required the comparison of the carrying value of the net assets of the income generating unit (Cadent Gas Limited) and its recoverable amount. The impairment review was completed following receipt of the Ofgem Final Determination, and the subsequent Final Determination by the Competition and Markets Authority ("CMA") following the appeal, and the internal business planning processes. These are all considered in light of their potential impact on the valuation.

The recoverable amount of the cash generating unit was determined from value in use calculations. The key assumptions for the value in use calculation are those regarding the underlying cash flows, discount rate, inflation and terminal value cashflow.

Underlying cash flows

In the short-term, the differences between actual cash flows and prior projections and budgets for Cadent Gas Limited are small due to the stable and predictable nature of the business. With 92% of revenue formula driven, there is a high level of predictability. This predictability of the cash flows and projections can be seen in the full year performance to 31 March 2022 where despite COVID-19 and increasing shrinkage and bad debt costs as a result of rising gas prices, the results were broadly in line with the budget. Further, both shrinkage and bad debt are cost neutral as future revenue allowances reflect these passthrough costs. The embedded debt outperformance provides c. 1% RORE outperformance in the medium term "guaranteeing" outperformance against the baseline allowed return.

The assumptions used in the Cadent Gas Financial Plan 2022 for the 5 years to March 2026 have been applied to the calculations undertaken in completing the impairment test, as detailed below. This Plan includes outturn data for the year to March 2022 and 4 years of forecast data.

The total expenditure (totex) forecasts included in our impairment model are a base case and assume the investment in the network will continue to 2045 and beyond. However, the base case does not include cash flows associated with the potential to re-purpose the network for hydrogen or other fuels. In the base case we continue to assume regulatory asset depreciation of 45 years and investment is fully capitalised into the RAV. This is consistent with the assumptions used for the Ofgem Final Determinations for RIIO-2.

We have determined the regulated weighted average cost of capital (WACC) and totex allowances using Ofgem's Final Determination and the outcome of the CMA appeal for the RII0-2 period. The regulatory cost of equity for RIIO2 is 4.55% (2021: 4.8%) and is forecast to increase in future price controls with forecasted increases in risk free rates.

Longer term, we have continued to assume that the Cadent Gas Repex programmes reduce in scale post-2032 following completion of the HSE mandated 30:30 replacement programme but the maintenance of the network and the service levels to customers is maintained. As noted above, we have not incorporated into the base case any additional investment in our network to make it hydrogen or biomethane-ready at this stage.

Discount rate

Cash flow projections have been discounted to reflect the time value of money, using a pre-tax discount rate of 5.4% (2021: 5.3%). Management estimates the discount rate using post-tax rates that reflect current market assessments of the time value of money and then converts to a pre-tax rate using an iterative calculative approach in the value-in-use methodology.

Inflation

In the RIIO-2 period the CPIH assumption at March 2022 of 2.35% (2021: 1.7%) is broadly based on the Ofgem assumptions contained within the price control model used for price setting. Given current forecasts for inflation, these assumptions are conservative.

The longer-term CPIH assumption of 2.0% (2021: 2.0%) is consistent with the Bank of England target rate for the Consumer Price Index including owner occupiers' housing costs (CPIH) and external long run forecasts which show a range of potential outcomes between 1.9% - 2.3% by 2026. Given the range of potential outcomes, we have adopted the Bank of England target of 2.0% as our long run CPIH assumption from 2027 to 2045.

Terminal value cashflow

A terminal value cash flow is applied in 2045; the end of the forecast period. The terminal value is calculated based on a RAV forecast multiple at 2045. Management has derived a RAV multiple of 1.2x (2021: 1.2x) by reviewing external sources of information on similar transactions. There has been no change in the market to warrant a revision to this assumption.

IAS 36 states that projections based on budgets and forecasts should cover a maximum five years whereas management have used projections out to 2045. However, management believe, whilst there is uncertainty when moving from one price control period into the next, there is otherwise a degree of predictability to the cash flows of the assets and therefore management consider that it is appropriate to project out to 2045 before a terminal value is applied.

Climate Change continues to result in uncertainty over the future use of Cadent Gas assets for transporting natural gas to heat homes and power industry, and management have considered this uncertainty when performing the impairment test.

The government's Green Industrial Revolution has Hydrogen as number 2 on the top 10 priorities and the 2022 Queen's Speech reiterated the importance of the British Hydrogen industry in the new Energy Security Bill. Cadent Gas continue to invest in programmes such as the Hydrogen Village, Hydrogen Home and HyNet to support our ambition to make hydrogen a safe, fair and reliable choice for consumers, and our long-term commitment to decarbonise homes and businesses in a way that minimises the impact to the consumer and creates jobs across the UK. Given the information currently available, it is still reasonable to assume that the entire network will continue to be used in 2045 and beyond, in its current form, adapted to accommodate hydrogen or biomethane, therefore we consider it appropriate to project out to 2045 before a terminal value is applied.

The receipt of the CMA Final Determination, in October 2021, and significant changes to inflation during the year indicated that the impairment loss recognised in prior years may have decreased. Management calculated an updated recoverable amount, using the assumptions above, and the calculation indicated that this had increased over prior years when impairment losses were recognised as a result of changes in estimates in respect of discount rates, return on equity and Totex, and resulted in an impairment reversal of £794,000,000 (2021: impairment reversal of £101,000,000).

Further sensitivity and key assumptions are included in note 16.

14 Financial risk management

The company's objective in managing risk is the creation and protection of shareholder value. Risk is inherent in the company's activities, but it is managed through a process of ongoing identification, measurement and monitoring, subject to risks limits and other controls. The process of risk management is critical to the company's continuing profitability. The company is exposed to market risk (which namely includes interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk arising from the financial instruments it holds.

The company's senior management oversees the management of those risks. The Management reviews and agrees policies for managing each of those risks, which are summarised below.

(a) Market risk

Market risk comprises the following types of risk: interest rate risk and currency risk. The maximum risk resulting from financial instruments equals their carrying amount.

Interest rate risk

The company is not exposed to changes in interest rates, as the company's Loan Notes are issued at a fixed interest rate of 6.7%.

Foreign currency risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. As the presentation currency and functional currency of the company is the same, i.e. GBP, the company has minimal exposure to foreign currency risk.

(b) Credit risk

The company passes debt finance from the Consortium to its immediate subsidiary Quadgas HoldCo Limited on identical terms. The principal risk of these arrangements is that Quadgas HoldCo Limited is unable to meet its obligations to the company. The company is exposed to the expected credit losses on its intercompany loan with Quadgas HoldCo Limited. The expected credit loss has been calculated by considering the probability of default and the loss given default on the balance outstanding on the intercompany loan.

Credit risk also arises from cash and cash equivalents held in banks and other financial institutions. Cash and cash equivalents are invested in major banks. The management of the company believes that the financial institutions that hold the company's investments are financially sound and accordingly, minimal credit risk exists with respect to cash and cash equivalents of the company.

(c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is defined as the risk the company will encounter difficulties in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Exposure to liquidity risks arises because of the possibility that the company could be required to pay its liabilities earlier than expected.

There are a number of these sensitivities which are mutually exclusive and therefore if one were to happen, another would not, meaning a total showing how sensitive our results are to these external factors is not meaningful.

The sensitivities all have an approximately equal and opposite effect if the sensitivity increases or decreases by the same amount unless otherwise stated. A negative value in the table below indicates the value of impairment which would be recognised, whereas a positive value indicates an increase in headroom. An increase in the carrying value of the investment can only be recognised to the extent that it reverses a previous impairment, in line with the requirements of IAS 36.
